Over the last decade, Canada's popularity as a high school abroad destination has steadily grown. From British Columbia in the west to the provinces of the Atlantic coast, Canada annually hosts tens of thousands of students from overseas on high school programmes. When these students return home, they tell their friends about their experience, generating ever greater waves of interest in Canadian schools. So what's behind this trend? Why are so many students choosing Canada when faced with more traditional options for schooling in an English-speaking country, such as the UK and the US? We think we know why.

discovered an important fact: Canada has one of the best education systems in the world, consistently ranked number one among English-speaking countries, and in the top 10 overall. Test results for reading, mathematics and science in the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) show that Canada's significant investments in its public education system over the past two decades are paying off. These impressive test scores have established Canada as a global leader in education planning and development.

EDUCATIONAL INVESTMENTS: Investments in public education take many forms, including infrastructure upgrades. Provincial Governments across the country have prioritized creating clean and comfortable

learning spaces equipped with the latest technology and teaching tools. This is especially obvious in the many "special interest" classes found in Canadian public schools. It is not uncommon, for example, to find schools with complete professional teaching kitchens, computer labs equipped with 3D printers and advanced robotics, or digital media labs with green screens, state-of-the-art video cameras and digital editing software. School Boards across the country incorporate the latest research on the link between physical space and learning when designing new schools and retrofitting older ones.

TEACHER EDUCATION: Even more significant investments, however, have been made in the pedagogy itself, and these have driven dramatic improvements in test scores and

learning outcomes for students over the past 20 years. Canadian public school teachers are exceptionally well-trained, usually with a minimum of two university degrees. This rigorous approach to teacher preparation means Canadian teachers have comprehensive training at a level not found in many other countries. Teachers are encouraged to continually upgrade their knowledge and skills well after graduation, with life-long additional qualifications and skills courses to help them grow in their careers. Well-compensated financially, our teachers are motivated to get involved in academic planning and innovation, a method proven to vastly improve learning outcomes and the overall student experience.

HOLISTIC EDUCATION: Canadian education places a strong emphasis on holistic education and preparing students for the real world. In addition to traditional subjects, students are expected learn about global citizenship, the importance of the arts, and the value of team sports, to name just a few. To graduate from high school, students are required to volunteer in their communities to understand the role volunteering plays in nurturing a caring and compassionate society. Canadian educators recognize that school is about much more than just preparing workers; our duty in 21st century schooling is increasingly to create well-rounded, innovative, critically thinking citizens who will lead us to a more just, sustainable, and equitable world community.

RESPECT OF DIVERSITY: International students in Canada encounter both a country and an education system that highly values their knowledge and input, and genuinely welcomes them into the fabric of Canadian life. A deep and enduring respect for multiculturalism is truly a "Canadian value". Canadians generally believe that diversity is a strength; that there is something to learn from opposing viewpoints rather than something to be conformed. Nowhere is this more vivid than in the old saying that Canada is a "cultural mosaic", an idea that stands in stark contrast to the U.S.A. vision of itself as a "cultural melting pot".

As a result, international students find that their presence in schools is highly valued. Their opinions and perspectives are sought out, and there is a firm belief that Canadian students learn as much from them as they do from their time in Canada. Students from overseas encounter schools that have excellent support systems in place for them, from resources to help improve their English/ French, to clearly identified members of the administration responsible for their success. Schools are flexible and understanding about differences in language and subject competency, and will work with international students to ensure a successful experience. In short, international students in Canadian public schools are treated with respect and are genuinely considered full and valuable members of the community.

SAFETY: For parents, safety is of course one of the most important factors when considering where to send their child for high school abroad, and Canada is widely recognized as one of the safest countries in the world. Low crime rates combine with an unparalleled conscientiousness about safety and public order to create a secure setting and critical peace of mind for parents. Clean, safe and modern public infrastructure makes for a stress-free and highly stimulating experience. Many students report that they can feel it as soon as they arrive, this pervasive sense of safety that permeates Canadian society, from coast to coast.

From incredible natural beauty to culturally vibrant cities and towns, as a country, Canada has a lot to offer international students. 

Public Schools

Deemed the school of choice for the vast majority of Canadians, public schools are widely available in every community, highly regulated by each provincial Ministry of Education, and open to students of all demographic, ethnic, cultural and socioeconomic levels.

With class sizes averaging 25 students, public schools deliver academic curriculum at varying levels, from the highest University level to more general levels aimed at students whose post-secondary plans may include avenues other than university. With a "no student left behind" philosophy, Canadian public schools prepare students for higher education and for life.

Complementing core academic studies are opportunities in the arts, technologies, music, business and more. International students are often amazed by the breadth of learning opportunities that exist in public schools.

Catholic-Public Schools

Three provinces in Canada continue to offer **publicly** funded schools that follow the Catholic faith: Alberta, Saskatchewan and Ontario (where CISS offers this option). Elsewhere, only independent schools can choose to be faithbased.

Academically, Catholic schools offer the same academic classes and structure as non-denominational or secular schools. All curriculum is developed and monitored by the provincial Ministry of Education. Catholic schools provide a further layer of moral and ethical education through the teachings of the Catholic church.

At the high school level, registration into the school is open to students of all religions and faiths, fostering an environment of respect. Religious education is simply one aspect of the larger academic curriculum. Catholic schools are equally focused on developing core academic strengths, artistic and athletic pursuits, and ensuring graduates are well prepared for all post-secondary avenues available to them.








WHAT MAKES CANADIAN **EDUCATION UNIQUE?**

Students learn best by doing. Canadian education is focused on a HANDS-ON learning approach that combines theoretical and practical study with learning experiences. Core academic skills are augmented by arts, technology and other skills based on each student's intended career goals. Continual assessments allow students to monitor their results and adjust their studies ahead of final course exams. Specific options below vary by school.


HIGH SCHOOL **TIMELINE**



YOUR HOME AWAY FROM HOME

The nurturing environment in a host family provides the support and care that students need to focus on their programme, achieve great academic results and successfully adjust to their new Canadian lifestyle. This is the preferred option of accommodation for 99% of international students in Canada.



What is a

Host families cannot be described in one "perfect" picture. Just as families around the world vary in their size, arrangements and demographics, so too do CISS host families. What they all have in common is their desire to share the Canadian experience and provide a caring home environment to students from around the world.

What are the requirements?

CISS 's internal homestay team (Homestay) screens, interviews and constantly monitors host families to ensure top quality care, safety and comfort for each student. Host families must be willing to provide the care and nurturing that a teen student requires, not just scholastically, but also socially and culturally. An Englishspeaking home environment (or French where required) is critical to ensuring students see an increase in their linguistic fluency. Families are encouraged to include the student in their daily activities. For an international student, he or she will become a member of their new Canadian family.

Building this special relationship requires a openness by both the student and the host family.

Why do families host?

Families choose to host for a wide variety of reasons. Many are proud of their community and want to share this with newcomers or find hosting to be an ideal way for their own children to know more about the world through having international students. Others have grown children and see this as an opportunity to continue to be parents.

What is the screening process?

CISS employs regional homestay coordinators, who recruit the families. New families are often referred by current hosts, or respond to general information sessions. A personal home inspection ensures the home is clean and well kept, and that there is a suitable private bedroom for the student. Adult family members must, under provincial laws, submit to a police reference check.

Who monitors the family?

We are privileged to be a wellrespected company, known for ensuring standards and personal contact with the hosting families. We employ coordinators in each city or region to manage, recruit and monitor the hosts in that area. During the programme, these coordinators closely monitoring each student's well-being through regular home visits and communication with host families. This information is incorporated into the CISS reports which are provided for every student, twice per semester.



Are host families paid?

CISS host families are compensated for hosting a student. We stress, however, that the financial reimbursement is intended to help offset the costs of having another family member. It is never intended to constitute a supplemental income.

Can we select our host family?

Our capable student coordinators and homestay team do their best to review student interests, likes, dislikes, allergies, school placement and activity requests when making the best possible match. We understand that a host family can never replace the student's own family. We know that the host family may have a different composition or background. It is vital to overall success that students and natural parents receive their host family with an open mind and an open heart. Host families are people who have chosen to open their homes and their lives. CISS, therefore, does not typically present a choice of families.

We always monitor the student to ensure that our choice was indeed a good match.

This programme is so important. It can make you grow and discover new things. In the future you will always remember the people you met here and all the experiences you had.

In this lower-cost, no-choice academic year option, CISS chooses a placement in an Ontario city or town where the student will be one of only a few international students in the school, offering a truly unique Canadian high school immersion experience.

We have designed this programme for students aged 15 or 16, who are eager to embark on a full immersion in a typical school in a small Canadian town or city. CISS staff carefully select the the location and school in which the student will be placed. The placement options are subject to our ever-changing inventory.

- Students must be open-minded to accept their community, school and host family placement as the programme does not allow students to choose the location
- Locations are currently situated in Central and Northern Ontario
- Communities range in population from approx 8,500 to over 50,000 residents
- Average size of a high school ranges from 400 students to 1000+

The World Student is one who seeks to take either AP (Advanced Placement) classes or be accepted into an IB programme for the purpose of furthering their university placement options in universities around the world.

The WORLD STUDENT is highly demanding, requiring an applicant with strong academic and English proficiency. IB or AP programmes may require students to have already completed similar preprogramme courses in home country.

You've taken the first steps in deciding to come to Canada; and now you understand the ups and downs of acclimatizing to life in a new culture. GREAT! Now let's discuss how you can get the most out of your experience.

When you arrive, the basic elements of your programme are already arranged: you have your new city, your school class timetable, a host family and your CISS coordinator that are ready to help you ease into your Canadian life. But to make all these elements work to become a great experience, you need to reach deep inside yourself.

Join Clubs: This is by far the best way to meet and connect with other students who will become your friends. It's very daunting to enter a new classroom for the first time, full of strangers (and to have to do this for EACH of your classes). Similarly, trying to make a friend in a sea of strangers in a huge cafeteria is not a simple task. Break it down. What do you enjoy doing? What are your hobbies? Do you like Photography? If so, join the photography club. You will suddenly be in a very small group of teens all with the same interest. Conversation will be easier, and smiles will come more readily. It's much easier to initiate a conversation with one or two people, than to try to hand-pick a friend in a classroom (but don't worry, that too will come as you get to know your classmates). Canadian high





schools offer a wide range of clubs to suit all interests- from arts and music, drama and fashion to math clubs, technology groups and more.

Try out for a sport: Are you a basketball player? Try out for the team! You cannot gain success if you don't try. Most coaches are happy to welcome new players - especially if you already have solid skills in a sport. Never played a sport? It might be a challenge to make the team, but lunchtime offers friendly recreational sports opportunities in the gym or outside. Don't be afraid. Some of our past students have become the 'star' player for their schools which gave them a real sense of belonging.

Communication: It's a two-way street! When someone takes an interest and starts to ask questions, answer back and then ask your own questions. By showing an interest, and actually communicating, rather than simply providing one-word answers, you will bring out your personality and show others what makes your heritage so great, and why you make an interesting friend. Our most successful homestay experiences are with students who talk to their families, who share their joys and their concerns. In today's world, communication is a key skill that employers and social partners seek.

Community involvement: Most Canadian diploma requirements include community service hours. The purpose is to ensure that students develop a sense of responsibility toward their community that will continue to serve them in adulthood. For international students, community involvement is an equally gratifying way to learn about their host city or town, and to learn about their environment outside of school. Communities are more than just shopping malls and brand name coffee shops. Independently owned shops and restaurants form the heart of neighbourhood and community.



ADJUSTING TO CULTURE SHOCK

Studying in Canada is an exciting adventure. You will be confronted with many new experiences - food, family life, geography, weather, and of course your new school. In the first few weeks, you'll meet lots of new friends, and learn new things at a fast pace. Sounds wonderful, right? It is! But most students also experience some degree of culture shock, and it's important to be aware of the process.

How and when it happens, and how severely, is different for everyone, but after the initial "honeymoon period" wears off, students may find they start to feel a little low. Speaking English (or French) all the time suddenly feels less exciting than it was at the beginning, more like a chore. You start to miss the foods you love, and the people in your life "back home". If you arrive in September, these negative feelings coincide with sun starting to rise later and set earlier as the northern hemisphere moves into the autumn cycle, worsening the feeling.

Don't despair! This is a totally normal process, and there is a great light at the end of the tunnel. The key to dealing with culture shock is being aware that it's happening, and using some strategies to help you through it. First, let's take a look at the typical process:





Most students hit the first dip somewhere around the end of September/early October (or end of February/ early March, if you're starting in the second semester). One important strategy to help you deal with those feelings is to communicate. Talk to your host family or your CISS Coordinator about how you're feeling. Or your teachers and counselors at school. Take advantage of the fact that there are lots of people looking out for you in this programme.

It's also important to make plans to stay active. Staying in your room by yourself, texting friends or family back home, is the worst thing you can do. Remember why you came to Canada! So seize the day, get outside, and get active. Joining a club at school is a great way to improve your mood.

Don't have hobbies? This is a good time to pick up a new one. In the fall, hiking is a great way to get some exercise and appreciate the beautiful colours of autumn; if it's in February, you could try skating or skiing, activities which you can find anywhere in Canada. In fact, just the process of making plans helps your brain overcome the low emotions.

Soon enough you'll push through the dip and start feeling positive again. This is very powerful because it means you're starting to truly adapt and come to deeply understand your new "home". Some of the most important learning will happen during this stage, and will continue until you leave.

So that's the end of Culture Shock, right? Not so fast! Look at the graph again; most people face a second dip when they return to their home countries. You'll start to question things about your own culture, and now you'll miss people and things you came to appreciate in Canada. You might find it's difficult to really make friends and family understand the experience you've been through, and sometimes that can feel a little bit lonely. But now you have the strategies - talk, make plans, stay active, and be aware of your own emotional journey. At the end, you'll be a much more mature person with a deep and enduring understanding of culture and the world, and that's one of the main objectives of the programme.
